FFB President's Message

Spring has sprung! Well, not really, but She sure is trying-robins and starlings are back, the valley snow is disappearing, the ice on the river's edge has receded and we can see the ground. Good enough for me. It has certainly been a long winter here in the valley this year and I know most of us are eager to get those rods out and go fishing. The first big insect event is just around the corner- the almighty Skwalla stonefly. This hatch can result in some exciting surface action, but don't limit you to this, as great nymphing can also be had. I am sure all of you fly tiers have been feverishly tying February's "Fly of the Month"- the Skwalla nymph by Greg Chester. For Adult patterns, refer to our archives found on the website. There is an excellent article in February 2015 titled 'Five for the Skwalla Hatch' and another one in March 2011. Between these patterns you should be well supplied to go fishing- but don't forget the small patterns such as the Baetis the 16s, 18s and 20s. If you don't tie flies, now you know what to focus on buying at our local fly shops. As we all eagerly await that "perfect" first day (or at least one free of pouring rain/sleet and blistering winds) remember the first rule of fishing- safety. Get your gear ready before you go fishing, not streamside. Check waders for leaks and boots for wear and tear. Wear a wading belt: its purpose is not to hold your waders up or be the latest fashion statement. Its function is to keep water out when you face plant in the river! Hypothermia is deadly. Use a wading staff if necessary. Fish with a buddy, or at least let someone know where you are going and when you plan to return. Ok now go fish, have fun and I look forward to some good fish tales next month!

FLY OF THE MONTH

The Almost There Baetis

This pattern comes from Blue Ribbon Flies of West Yellowstone and is an easy-to-tie and simple emerger pattern that seems to fool trout wherever I have fished it. Big, smart trout will usually opt for an emerger or cripple pattern floating down in the film over a high floating dun pattern and this tie qualifies in every respect. Even the most inexperienced tier should be able to knock out a dozen of this pattern in under an hour.



Hook: Daichi 1140 Or 1150, size 18 and 20

Thread: Uni 8/0 Olive Dun

Tail: three lemon wood duck fibers

Body: Tying thread

Thorax: Gray-Olive Beaver or Superfine dubbing

Wing: Enrico Puglisi EP Trigger Point Fibers BWO

Begin by wrapping a thread base from just behind the eye to about one third of the way down the hook bend. Tie in three lemon wood duck fibers and then wrap your thread forward forming the body of the fly with the thread. Dub a ball of gray-olive beaver or superfine dubbing forming a thorax. Wrap the thread forward to the hook eye forming a thread base and tie in the wing using two or three wraps to secure the wing and then one wrap behind the wing. Lift the excess wing material forward of the tie in point and whip finish. Cut the excess material protruding over the hook eye (Elk Hair Caddis style).

Trim the back of the wing even with the tie in point for the tail.

An important step in building a durable version of this pattern is laying down a thin thread base forward of the dubbing ball thorax. The thread base prevents the wing material (very slippery stuff) from rotating around the hook shank.

For those of you with aging eyes try fishing this pattern as a short trailer fly off a larger ant, beetle or parachute pattern that you can see. Enjoy!

The FFB has planned their annual outing to the Missouri River for April 17-20. Activities will be centered around the Headhunters Fly shop in Craig, Montana. Club members either bring RV's, or rent one of the limited cabins available, to take advantage of this exciting fishery. Many rent Guides for all, or part of their outing, or reserve one of the "Veteran" drift boats graciously provided by Headhunters. The Fly Shop also has reduced guide rates at this time as well.

Even without a boat, the Missouri around Craig has some excellent bank/wade fishing opportunities, especially towards evening. Nymph-fishing is the center piece of the action, but if a hatch comes off, the dry-fly fishing is wonderful. And, with big Browns all along this section of "the Mo", stripping a Streamer can lead to" the fish of the year"..!

Club members gather every evening for pot-luck food and beverages and at least one group dinner at Izaaks restaurant right next to the Fly shop. After a long Winter...consider joining other FFB members for the first outing of the year and hopefully some memorable fishing, on the "Big Mo"!!

BROWN'S LAKE

As Spring approaches, many FFB members begin to turn their attention to the "Ice-out" event at Browns Lake. One of the Club's resident "Browns Lake- Gurus", believes this will happen later than normal this year, possibly the end of April, or early May. Is this any place for a self-respecting Fly Fisherman? It is, if you want to try for Arlee and Kamloops Rainbows up to 10- pounds!! The lake fishes best in early in the year, especially the first month after ice-out.

At around 500 acres, it is perfect for pontoons, float tubes, and other small boats. Club members have organized impromptu trips on short notice, to an undeveloped campground near the boat launch. There are no reservations, but plenty of room, and a public rest room near the launch. The timing depends on nature, but if you have an

interest, stay tuned at the monthly meeting, or the FFB web site. Perhaps you can join up with someone, or a group, to hook up with other members for an early Spring "Hog-fest".....!


Georgetown Lake

Perhaps the highlight of the FFB outings, is the annual Georgetown Lake trip, **somewhere around the middle of July**. Georgetown is a high (6,000 ft), shallow, weedy lake of 3,000 acres, which supports incredible trout numbers. Primarily a Rainbow trout lake, there are also good numbers of Brookies and Kokanee present. Trout up to 15 pounds have been reported, with a good number of 20-plus inches, 4 pound Rainbows not uncommon! Our club trip has evolved into a multi-day campout, with almost 3 dozen attendees last year! Although day trippers were also common, it's much more fun to come and stay, sharing the day's fishing with fellow FFBers around a campfire

There are hatches on Georgetown that can only be labeled...."events"....Damsel flies, callibaetis, and the incredible Traveling Sedge in July. The Sedge hatch is NOT for the "faint of heart"! I personally experienced such an event during our trip last year. When these big, skittering bugs hatch, and are on the water (usually late afternoon), and the trout key on them, the only word to describe it is ... "violent"!!

It doesn't last long, but it was one of the most incredible 90 minutes of fishing I have ever had!

The fishing underneath is exceptional as well, with Damsel nymphs, Buggers, Chronimids, Hares Ears, and Pheasanttails, among many others. Once you find the trout's favorite "fly-du-jour", hang on for some great fishing! This is truly great stillwater fishing in July, with the stunning scenery and wildlife of the Georgetown lake area on full display. It's not too early to start making plans for joining the club on this memorable event!!



<u>May Fly Fishing Clinic</u> Each May, on four consecutive Wednesday evenings, the Club, in conjunction with the Bitterroot chapter of Trout Unlimited, puts on a fly fishing clinic for men and women ages 16 and up. This year, it will be held at the Slack Barn at The Teller. (Look for posters at your favorite fly shop.) This Clinic is for beginner and intermediate fly fishers and a wonderful source of information and hands on learning about casting, stream entomology and fly tying and all the components that go into our beloved sport..

Special Needs Day: This is an annual event for us, originally organized by Leon Powell and Jim Cline. We host about twenty special needs folks at a private, stocked pond. We try to ensure each catches a fish and then we feed them lunch. This event is truly one of the most gratifying things our Club does. You've got to see the grins and hear the whoops when these folks catch a fish! We need a good turn out by members because it really takes about a one-to-one relationship to help these folks. The event generally occurs on a Sunday morning in June or July. Stay tuned for more info.

June 24, 2017 Fly Fishing Workshop

Fly Fishers of the Bitterroot is sponsoring a one day workshop on Saturday June 24, 2017. The featured presenters will be Rick Hafele and Dave Hughes. They are the co-authors of Western Hatches, which many consider to be the definitive book on this topic

The course will include a presentation followed by streamside collection and identification of insects. This is followed by a session on matching the insects with the best flies. Demonstrations of best fishing techniques for dry fly, wet fly, and nymph fishing will follow. At the end of the day, one-on-one casting tune-ups will be available from certified IFFF casting instructors.

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are provided. The dinner is a Bar-BQ with beer and wine included. Evening entertainment follows. The event will be held at Steve Lilburn's Hannon House south of Darby. Wading Advice For those not practicing the Bitterroot Dunk, we have several tips on wading, now that the Bitterroot River is coming up. First, if the water looks too high and fast, it probably is. Trust your instincts. Second, use a wading staff. The fly shops all sell great folding staffs or simply pick up a stout stick on the bank (making absolutely clear it is a stick and not a snake). Third, slide your feet instead of picking them up to step. High stepping is for Saturday night, not river wading. Stay dry when you cast the fly.

River Safety Reminder It has been awhile since the news of Dick Galli and his tragic river accident touched us all on May 6. According to news reports, three fishermen in a raft became entangled in shrubs or debris on the Bitterroot River downstream from Anglers Roost. Their raft overturned, ejecting all three. Two men made it to safety and the third, Dick, continued downstream where he became hung up on other debris. Imagine if you can, trying to swim in high and fast waters of the Bitterroot during this seasonal snow melt condition while hypothermia begins to settle in. It's easy to look back at this tragedy and second-guess those involved. Truth is most of us can probably put ourselves in those same conditions. We all make mistakes. Some of us have experienced a dunk or two and can relate to that hypothermia feeling in water so cold even breathing is a struggle. I have been dumped from my kick-boat and experienced the struggle of getting my thoughts together for a successful recovery. With today's safety equipment, including rafts that tame the meanest rivers, and communications devices that keep us in touch with the push of a button, it's easy to downplay the dangers we face as anglers each day. And while it's hardly fun to consider what may go wrong, doing so just might save your life. It all starts with life jackets, but doesn't end there. What would you do if your boat overturned or sprung a major leak, or lost a couple oars? What would you do if a member of your party suffered a heart attack? Preparation and preplanning is everything. Playing through potential scenarios makes you consider and hopefully address circumstances that can lead to disaster. Give it some thought each time you enter the water, whether it be a lake or a river. Discuss with your floating group what they might do should an emergency present itself. Your life or that of a friend or loved one may depend on it. Please, be safe. Ed Couchman

State Senator proposes Barbless Hooks on Some Rivers

Bitterroot Committee meets on West Fork Crowding The newly formed Bitterroot River Recreational Advisory Committee (BRRAC) was created by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks to address concerns over crowding and reduced wading angler opportunities on the West Fork of the Bitterroot and the upper river down to Wally Crawford Fishing Access Site. The BRRAC will finalize its proposal in a meeting on March 6. The proposal under consideration will close portions of the upper river and West Fork to commercial outfitters one day a week. However, there are five alternate proposals. There will be at least one public meeting after March 6 to take public comment.
