THE MEETING

There are robins in my yard and grapple on the porch. What's going on? Winter came down with dementia this year. But a few of you are out exercising willing trout. I've even seen a raft or two. Me? I'm still tying so I'm ready when I no longer worry about my guides freezing. But it's getting bad. The snowflakes make me think I'm in a hatch.

We meet Tuesday, March 6, 2012, at BJ's located at 900 N. 1st Street, Hamilton. General fish tails start at 6:00 pm and the program starts at 7:00 pm.

THE SPEAKER

The program is "A Local's Guide to the Paradise Valley Spring Creeks" by Brant Oswald. The program will cover fishing on Armstrong, Nelson's and DePuy's Spring Creeks, with special emphasis on off-season hatches and fishing, trip planning on short notice, and other approaches available to Montana residents.

Brant was given his first fly rod at age 10, and he spent most of his teens exploring small streams or dragging a Woolly Worm behind a float tube on southern Idaho's desert reservoirs. His college career included two degrees in linguistics from the University of Oregon, but he left academia in 1983 to become director of Orvis' fishing school program in California.

Brant has worked in nearly every segment of the fly fishing industry--as a

commercial fly tier (his first paying job in his early teens), fishing school instructor/director (for both Orvis and the Mel Krieger schools), fishing travel consultant, fly shop manager, casting instructor, and now as a guide and outfitter in Livingston, Montana. As a guide, Brant spends most of his days with clients on the Paradise Valley spring creeks (Armstrong, DePuy's, and Nelson's) and the Yellowstone River.

Brant has written extensively for fly fishing periodicals—as a columnist for both *The Angler's Journal* and *Wild Trout Journal*, and has been a contributor to *Big Sky Journal*, *Fly Fishing Retailer*, *Rod & Reel*, and *Wild on the Fly*, as well as *Tight Loop* and *Flyfisher*, both Japanese fly fishing magazines. He now contributes regularly online, particularly at *Midcurrent.com*. Over the years, Brant has been active with conservation groups, including CalTrout, the Joe Brooks (Livingston, Montana) Chapter of Trout Unlimited, and the Park County Environmental Council, and he served on the Governor's Upper Yellowstone River Task Force. Brant's other interests include photography, cooking, traditional bow hunting, and bird hunting with his Labradors.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Mercer's Skwala by Denny Westover

Recipe

Hook: TMC 2302 sixes 10 and 12

Thread: Olive UTC Ultra Thread, 70 denier

Bead: Tungsten, black. Match to size

Tail: Turkey Biot Quills, olive

Rib: Fine gold wire

Carapace: Thin Skin, mottled olive Abdomen: Mercer's z wing caddis

Buggy Nymph Dubbing* Thorax: Same as abdomen

Wing case: Thin Skin, mottled olive Legs: Silli Legs, olive/black flake or

orange/black flake

Antenna: Ringneck Pheasant Tail fibers

*available from The Fly Shop, www.theflyshop.com, A more readily available substitute is Hareline Dubbin, Dark Olive Brown, especially when mixed with a little chopped clear Antron to add sparkle.

Mercer's Skwala has become my go-to nymph pattern from mid-March to mid-April on the Bitterroot and other rivers with a good population of Skwala stoneflies. It is a semi realistic pattern that sinks quickly and fools even the larger trout. It is fairly easy to tie and is quite durable. The pattern was originated by Mike Mercer, a very creative tyer from Redding, CA and The Fly



Shop. www.theflyshop.com. I fish this fly as a single fly or in tandem with a smaller baetis nymph or midge nymph. Trout, especially the larger ones, tend to favor slower water and the insides of bends and riffles during the Skwala hatch. Many of my largest fish have come from tiny inside seams with barely enough water to cover their dorsal fins. This fly is also effective fished as a dropper below a beefy foam Skwala pattern buoyant enough to float the tungsten beadhead. Fish this nymph when water temperatures are 39 to 42 degrees then switch to a dry Skwala when the water temperature reaches 43 degrees. Good Fishing!!!
