The Program

Andy Carlson, owner of Bitterroot Anglers, has been an international fly fishing outfitter and educator/teacher for over 42 years; including 11 years orchestrating and outfitting the fly fishing programs at the Stock Farm, Hamilton, Montana, a Charles Schwab venture.

He is the inventor of many fly patterns including his most famous the "Purple Haze". Andy has been a trout activist since his college years at Colorado University, Boulder (1972-76). He has also earned the award of Montana Trout Unlimited, Fly Fisherman of the year. Andy and a small group of activists helped create minimum flow waters in the Bitterroot River via the acquisition of stored waters at Painted Rocks Reservoir up the West Fork of the Bitterroot River, instrumental in managing the River's wild trout populations.



Andy has been involved in trout/water politics since 1972. At that time, he lead a successful political and biological science campaign with the help of Colorado Environmental Water Quality Division. He assisted in saving a small mountain stream (Coon Trail Creek) in front of his cabin in the mountain high country, west of Boulder, Colorado.

In 1979, Andy helped spear-head Western Montana's move to a "wild trout" fishery. He sat on the board of directors of the Montana Trout Foundation with fly-fishing luminaries Dan Bailey and Bud Lilly. Andy also published the MTF newsletter and Trout Unlimited's "Troutline", the state newspaper for TU.

The Montana Trout Foundation funded many trout/water conservation projects throughout the state of Montana in the early 1980's throughout the mid 1990's. His passionate concern for the river environment of the Bitterroot helped to revivify the stream of this day.

Andy has taught fly-fishing schools and guide schools for the past 27 years in Montana and more recently, California. He helped in writing, lobbying and passing the Montana Stream Access Law for all fishermen and women.

The professionalism exhibited by Bitterroot Anglers and its owner, Andy Carlson is unmatched in Western Montana. Please come to join us in a guided float trip and/or enjoy casting one of Andy's fly patterns over hungry rising trout on your favorite river.

Fly of the Month

Skwalla Nymph by Greg Chester

Spring is just around the corner and the sight of trout eagerly rising to a dry fly won't come too soon. We saw a few sporadic rises early in February but it's still a sub-surface, bottom bouncing presentation that draws the most strikes at the moment.

We're fortunate in the Bitterroot to have such a diverse bug population and even more privileged to have the Skwalla Stonefly to kick off our spring fishing. Before hitting the river most anglers wait for the bugs to surface, but if you're really eager to get started I think you'll be pleased with some nymph fishing until the fish start looking up, plus you'll likely have your special spot all to yourself.

This basic pattern has worked well for me over the years and you can imitate any stonefly nymph by simply changing color and size. You may embellish it with soft hackle or rubber legs, a segmented thorax or a bead but it works quite well as shown. This pattern calls for dark olive but dark brown will likely work as well. I tie it weighted and add split shot when fishing. Work on getting a natural drift - it's just as important when bouncing nymphs along the bottom as it is dead drifting a dry over risers.



Good tying and good fishing!

Recipe

Hook: Size 8 or 10 heavy wire 3XL nymph hook (Dai-Riki #710 e.g.) Weight: 10 – 15 wraps of .025 diameter lead wire Thread: 3/0 Dark olive Unithread Tails: Black or dark brown goose biots, split Abdomen: Dark olive Hare-Tron dubbing tightly wrapped in a dubbing loop Ribbing: Black vinyl v-rib, medium Wing case: Dark olive or dark brown Thin Skin Thorax: Dark olive Hare-Tron dubbing picked out on sides & trimmed flat on bottom Head: Tying thread

Fly Fishing Workshop "Learn from the Best "

Fly Fishers of the Bitterroot are sponsoring a one day workshop on Saturday June 24, 2017. The featured presenters will be Rick Hafele and Dave Hughes. They are the co-authors of <u>Western Hatches</u>, which many consider to be the definitive book on this topic

The course will include a presentation followed by streamside collection and identification of insects. This is followed by a session on matching the insects with the best flies. Demonstrations of best fishing techniques for dry fly, wet fly, and nymph fishing will follow. At the end of the day ,one-on-one casting tune-ups will be available from certified IFFF casting instructors.

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are provided. The dinner is a Bar-BQ with beer and wine included. Evening entertainment follows. The event will be held at Steve Lilburn's Hannon House south of Darby. Hamilton State Senator proposes Barbless Hooks on Designated River

Recently Senator Pat Connell introduced Senate Bill 74, which would require the use of barbless hooks or hook with the barbs crimped down in all state waters that are designated "catch and release." Connell sees this bill as a conservation measure and feels that it will enhance the quality of recreation, which is important in the state economy. Fish, Wildlife and Parks generally supports the bill, but Walleyes Unlimited and the Montana Wildlife Federation oppose the bill. An article on this bill appeared on the front page of the "Ravalli Republic" on January 14. As a non-political organization, FFB will not take a public stand on the bill, but individual members certainly are free to contact their legislators in either support or opposition.
